Following on from previous scrutiny of this matter, the Committee considered the business case for the integration of certain parts of County Council adult social care with the new Partnership NHS Trust. In doing so, they took account of the views of the Assets and Budget Scrutiny Committee who had examined the business case as part of their scrutiny of the County Council's Medium Term Financial Strategy.	
Both Committees submitted letters to the Cabinet Member for Adults' Wellbeing, with their comments and recommendations, for the Cabinet to take into account when making a decision on this matter on 21 December 2011. A formal response was requested.	
The Health Scrutiny Committee gave their support for the principle of greater integration of health and social care for the benefit of the patient (greater equity and coherence in service delivery) and agreed that the Partnership NHS Trust was the right vehicle for this. However, concerns included in the correspondence related to: governance; patient feedback and complaints; and savings.	
The Cabinet Member was asked to advise the Committee, at appropriate points, of progress with preparing for, and making, the transfer. In particular, Members wanted to know about any serious incidents and complaints around this time. In the medium term, the Committee were interested in how integration built.	
Consultation on Proposals to Redesign Inpatient Mental Health Services Across South Staffordshire	District/Borough Councils in the south of the county
The Committee considered the consultation, inviting feedback from the District/Borough Council representatives of those committees dealing with health scrutiny who had considered this matter separately. Scrutiny focused on Members' concerns about: record sharing and keeping; sharing intelligence to identify people at risk; engaging all GPs; developing the skills of the Teams; mental health input; and the fit with other community services (particularly Out of Hours and to respond to crises) in the context of the Fit for the Future programme.
