Section 3: About the proposed change

The new legislation has been introduced to take effect during the May 2023 elections. The national VAC application portal went live on 16 Jan 2023.

All registered electors (or their proxys) are now required to present approved Photo ID at a polling station in order to be provided with a ballot paper.

In addition, returning officers are now required to consider any measure which assists voters with additional needs in order to cast their vote.
