

# The Lichfield District Community Safety Delivery Plan 2020-2023

### **Our Priorities**

The proposed priorities for 2020/21 are set out below:

- Anti-social behaviour
- Domestic Abuse
- Burglary (car-key)
- Fraud
- Awareness raising and public reassurance (Burglary [car key], fraud, modern day slavery, hate crime and prevent)
- County Lines
- Vulnerable Persons: alcohol

There will also be a focussed project around the City Centre as many of the priority issues do affect the City Centre and there are focussed resources such as the Business Advisory Group (BAG) and Business Improvement District (BID) available in the city centre.

## These priorities have been identified through the Community Safety Strategic Assessment, Lichfield which is included as Appendix 1.

The Plan also supports the general priorities of Staffordshire Police Fire and Crime Commissioner which are:

- Early Intervention and prevention
- Supporting Victims and Witnesses
- Managing Offenders
- Public Confidence

We note the need to work together to reduce repeat and persistent offending and the wider partnership challenges of:

- Modern Slavery
- Fire and Rescue
- Business Crime
- Serious Violence
- Community Cohesion and Hate Crimes
- Counter Terrorism/Prevent

#### Overview

The driver for the Community Safety Plan continues to be the strategic assessment produced by the Staffordshire observatory. This has identified the key priorities for Lichfield. However, there are a number of areas where the information, data and intelligence held locally could and should be used alongside the strategic assessment to better inform the approach in Lichfield. Consequently part of the plan during 2020/21 will be to identify these additional sources of information and to use them effectively to enhance the picture locally. As an example, the data used for anti-social behaviour is entirely based on police data and information reported to the police by members of the public. In addition to that we have ASB that is reported to and managed by registered social landlords across the district. There are also the ASB reports received in the District Council. Collating all this

information alongside the information form Staffordshire Police will give a clearer picture of the level of and location of ASB across the partnership.

Managing risk and harm is key to the effective work of the Community Safety Partnership. In 2019/20 the partnership Hub, that meets weekly was refreshed to focus more on those cases that pose the most risk and harm, the most complex cases involving many agencies and those that have the largest drain on public finances. In 2019/20 there was also the introduction of Vulnerable Adolescents Multi-Agency Panel (VAMAP) in Lichfield. This manages the risk to and from young people at risk of Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) and Criminal Exploitation (CE). In 2020/21 a revised arrangements for managing domestic abuse through Multi-Agency Risk Assessment Conference (MARAC) will be introduced. It is vital that both these meetings liaise closely and effective with the local Partnership Hub, allowing for escalation and de-escalation of risk and harm and avoiding unnecessary and wasteful duplication.

### The Lichfield District Priorities 2020/21

#### Anti-social Behaviour (ASB)

Although in comparison to other districts in Staffordshire the level of ASB in Lichfield is relatively low, ASB is assessed to be high volume, cause moderate individual harm but have the potential for severe community harm. With 2,250 reported cases to the Police in 2018/19 an increase of 8% on the previous year, tackling ASB remains a key priority across the partnership. Local hotspot wards have been identified as Chasetown and Stowe. The latter being the ward that covers the city centre and will therefore probably include ASB associated with the night time economy. Further work will be undertaken to assess why Chasetown is identified as a hotspot ward.

The partnership response to ASB will continue to focus on diversionary activities around the known youth ASB hotspots and close working with local police and PCSOs alongside the new ASB Worker role. This will be a combination of engagement with young people, signposting them towards positive activities and where necessary individual enforcement plans, use of level one warnings, Acceptable Behaviour Contracts and in the worst cases injunctions or Community Protection Notices.

In terms of public reassurance, it is proposed to update the community safety ASB leaflet in conjunction with the Crime Prevention Panel (CPP) and the Police. This then will be available at the events and shows the CPP attend throughout the year. It will also be available to the local PCSOs. As well as offering reassurance, the leaflet with offer guidance as to how to self-manage any issues of ASB and advise on the best ways of getting help to respond to it.

We will continue to offer a mediation service where disputes between neighbours cannot readily be resolved.

The most complex ASB cases will be considered by the weekly Lichfield Partnership Hub meeting. This multi-agency meeting manages the most complex cases, the ones posing the most harm to communities.

The development of better information around ASB, where it is occurring, how it is being managed and how effectively this is coordinated will be a supplementary project for 2020/21.

#### **Domestic Abuse**

Domestic abuse is assessed in Lichfield to be moderate volume, severe individual harm and substantial community harm. It is a priority for all community safety partnerships across Staffordshire. There is a recorded increase of 6% in the year to the end of October 2019. Hot-spot wards have been identified as Chadsmead and Chasetown.

The partnership response to domestic abuse will primarily be coordinated through the Lichfield Multi-Agency Risk Assessment Conference (MARAC). High risk cases will be actively managed through the MARAC and support agencies, both statutory and voluntary will be engaged and held to account at the MARAC. The enhancement of Police support to the MARAC through the Harm Reduction Officer role within Lichfield Police will be welcomed, it will also afford the opportunity to assess the effectiveness of the work to reduce the harm caused by domestic abuse across the partnership.

Services to support victims of domestic abuse will continue to be supported as will programmes that work with perpetrators to reduce the risk they pose.

There will continue to be awareness raising to ensure that people who are at risk of, or suffer from, domestic abuse know how to access help.

Fresh data sources will be sought to supplement the information from the strategic assessment. Currently the focus is on number of reported cases to the Police. In future, it is proposed that this be extended to the assessment of and reduction of risk as the driver for partnership engagement. The MARAC will have a key role in this, working alongside the partnership Hub.

## Awareness raising and public reassurance (Burglary [car key], fraud, modern day slavery, hate crime and prevent).

Burglary (car key) and fraud are new priorities for Lichfield in 2020/21. Raising awareness of these issues and risk in the key areas is the primary role for the partnership. As such these priorities are included in a wider section in the action plan of awareness raising.

For Burglary (car key) the rate for the district is higher than the force average (5.9 offences per 1,000 compared to 5.2). There are hot-spot areas for car key burglary of Shenstone, Bourne Vale and Little Aston & Stonnall.

Fraud again tends to focus on more affluent areas and can include a variety of scams and fraud activities. Developing resilience in the most at risk communities will be the primary role for the partnership.

#### **County Lines**

"'County Lines' is a term used when drug gangs from big cities expand their operations to smaller towns, often using violence to drive out local dealers and exploiting children and vulnerable people to sell drugs"<sup>i</sup>. The strategic assessment assesses this to be small volume but significant in terms of community harm. Lichfield District bordering the large metropolitan area of the West Midlands as it does, with excellent transport links, has an increased risk of County Line activity.

The partnership will raise awareness and build resilience amongst young people by working closely

with the Young People Services Group and schools and by actively contributing to the Vulnerable Adolescents Multi-Agency Panel (VAMAP) to seek to prevent harm to those who are most at risk. This will be coordinated through the partnership Hub with the development of an escalation/de-escalation process with the Partnership Hub and VAMAP.

Safeguarding training to include Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) and Criminal Exploitation (CE) will also be delivered to councillors, council staff and licensed taxi drivers.

The partnership will also contribute to multi-agency plans to disrupt and dismantle organised crime groups that operate in the Lichfield District.

#### **Vulnerable Persons: Alcohol**

Alcohol is a cross cutting factor in a number of crimes: ASB, Domestic Abuse, Violent crime and Public place violence. Over the whole district, alcohol related crimes are relatively low, however, there are two wards with uncharacteristically high alcohol flagged offences, Stowe, and Chadsmead. In Stowe this may be linked to a relatively high level public place violence, particularly between the hours of 21.00 to 04.00.

It is also estimated that there is a high level of alcohol dependency in Lichfield.

The partnership, through its weekly hub meeting does identify vulnerable people who are alcohol (or other substances) dependant. We will also seek to coordinate supportive services from the voluntary sector to support those at most risk.

Work will continue within the City Centre project to reduce public place violence in the night time economy.

#### **City-centre – Focussed project**

Stowe ward features as a hot-spot ward across a basket of recorded crimes. There are therefore a range of issues within the city centre that we can work effectively with partners to tackle. These include; shoplifting, city centre ASB, public place violence, offences with alcohol as an aggravating factor, and street begging.

Where there is specifically business related crime we will work closely with the Business Advisory Group and Business Improvement District to develop collaborative solutions. There will also be better coordinated work across the different existing groups in the city centre; Pubwatch, Storewatch and with voluntary groups that are active in the city centre such as the Late Night Listeners.

Enforcement will be used appropriately and promptly where necessary and there will be an agreed partnership approach to issues such as rough sleeping and street begging, including the development of an alternative giving scheme.
